Demolition Begins at Washington Manor

Four buildings have been demolished at Washington Manor and three are scheduled to come down in preparation for phase four of the Charleston Replacement Housing plan to redevelop public housing. Eighty (80) new units will be constructed on the Washington Manor site. There will be 36 one-bedroom handicap accessible units, 20 two-bedroom and 24 three-bedroom units. All of these units will operate as low income housing tax credit (LIHTC) units and will be available for occupancy by households at 60% of area median income.
